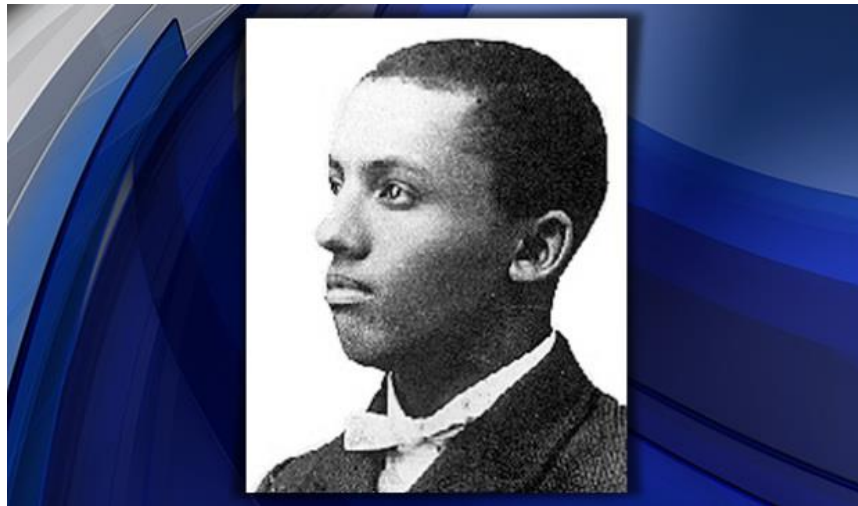

Lieutenant Colonel William Clayton Bennett Chief Deputy, Chesapeake Sheriff's Office

Lt. Colonel William "Clayton" Bennett is a native of the City of Chesapeake. He graduated from Norfolk Catholic High School in 1978 where he played football, basketball, and ran track. Lt. Colonel Bennett is a 33-year veteran of the Chesapeake Sheriff's Office and began his career with the office in 1982 as a Deputy Sheriff. During his career, Lt. Colonel Bennett rose through the ranks and served as the Chief of Corrections for 5 years prior to his promotion to Lieutenant Colonel on April 1, 2014. Lt. Colonel Bennett is the first African American to achieve this rank in the Chesapeake Sheriff's Office.

Lt. Colonel Bennett has said, "my father believed in the importance of education, faith, and helping the community" and this has been an inspiration to him. Lt. Colonel Bennett earned his Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Ohio Dominican University in 1982. He graduated with Honors in 1988 from the Virginia Beach Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Academy. Lt. Colonel Bennett is also a graduate of the Portsmouth Police Department's SWAT and K-9 Patrol Academy. He has the distinction as serving as the first African American K-9 officer in the City of Chesapeake and served as a member of the Chesapeake Police Department's SWAT team from 1983 to 1988. As his career continued he obtained certification as a Certified Jail Manager through the American Jail Association.

Lt. Colonel Bennett has received a variety of awards and recognitions during his career including: the 2015 Martin Luther King Jr. Leadership Award; the 2014 Hall of Fame Award from the Virginia Law Enforcement Torch Run; and the 2007 Unsung Hero Award named in Honor of Kenny Fields. Lt. Colonel Bennett is a member of the Chesapeake Fraternal Order of Police #9, the Chesapeake Public Safety Alliance, Chesapeake Law Enforcement Benevolent Association, the Virginia State Sheriffs' Association, the American Jail Association, and the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation. For the past 19 years, Lt. Colonel has been highly involved with Special Olympics – helping children with intellectual disabilities overcome barriers through sports. Lt. Colonel Bennett said, "I got hooked, and once you get the bug, you can't walk away". His dedication to Special Olympics is second to none. In 2002, Lt. Colonel Bennett founded – Chesapeake Cycle-mania which raised more than \$100,000 for Special Olympics in one weekend. Lt. Colonel Bennett also served a number of years volunteering his time coaching recreation football in the Great Bridge and South Norfolk area of Chesapeake.

From his childhood years, Lt. Colonel Bennett has always been active in community service and held increasingly responsible positions. He attributes much of his success to his parents, who taught him and instilled the values of education, helping others, and giving back. Many times, both individuals who he has coached, mentored, seen in the community or even given a jail tour to, have thanked him for helping them. As an example, at an event in Chesapeake a few years ago, two adult brothers from the South Norfolk area approached him and asked, "Are you Coach Bennett"? The young men identified themselves and Lt. Colonel Bennett realized that he had coached them when they were 9 and 10. Both young men had productive years playing varsity football in high school and were doing well. Lt. Colonel Bennett said, "It made me feel good, and that's two lives I know I touched". When Lt. Colonel Bennett is not busy with work or volunteering his time, he enjoys spending time with his wife of 31 year, Maria. He also enjoys fishing and watching football. Lt. Colonel Bennett and Maria have one daughter who they are extremely proud of, Lisette, a Hickory High School graduate who holds an undergraduate degree from the University of Virginia and a graduate degree from Longwood University.



**Dr. Darnell Johnson, Distinguished Professor and Mentor
Chair, Department of Mathematics and Computer Science
Elizabeth City State University**

Dr. Darnell Johnson is currently the E.V. Wilkins Distinguished Professor for the Department of Education/STEM at Elizabeth City State University in Elizabeth City, North Carolina. He is married to Dr. Stephanie Johnson, who currently serves as Coordinator of the Master of Arts in Education Leadership at Hampton University.

Dr. Johnson retired from Portsmouth Public Schools after thirty years of service as a secondary mathematics teacher and middle school principal. Later he served as the department chair for mathematics and computer science at Elizabeth City State University and assistant dean for the College of Education and Continuing Studies at Hampton University.

Dr. Darnell Johnson is a Distinguished Professor of Education with an emphasis in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). He has coordinated STEM related research and activities for 11 years with The Center of Excellence in Remote Sensing Education Research at ECSU.

Dr. Darnell Johnson is frequently sought by local, state, and national associations to present papers on education and science, and he has published pamphlets and books in the educational field to include "Perceived Mentor Benefits from a Formal Mentoring Experience," and "Middle School Resource Guide for Success with Virginia Standards of Learning Curriculum", Portsmouth, Virginia

Dr. Johnson met his wife of forty-three years at I.C. Norcom High School in Portsmouth, Virginia, and attended Elizabeth City State University in North Carolina where he majored in mathematics and she majored in elementary education. Both graduated from ECSU cum laude. During college days at ECSU Dr. Darnell Johnson was the President of the Student Government Association, president of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., Who's Who in American Education Colleges and Universities in 197 and 1973, member of the 1971 Championship CIAA Football Team, was first student athlete in the history of the CIAA awarded the NCAA Post graduate Fellows Scholar, and drafted as a free agent by the Dallas Cowboys. He was inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame for I.C. Norcom and Elizabeth City State University, and holds a life membership in the ECSU Alumni Association, incorporated.

Advanced degrees were conferred on Dr. Johnson from the University of Kentucky, Old Dominion University and The George Washington University. He has served on numerous boards, councils, local and state committees for civic and employment related activities, and received awards and recognition from organizations throughout Hampton Roads and the Maryland- North Carolina region.

The Drs. Johnson currently serve as consultants and facilitators for marriage seminars, educational divisions, government agencies, and regional, state and national conferences. Dr. Darnell Johnson and Dr. Stephanie Johnson have been marriage forty-three years. They are parents of Dawn Johnson-Green and three wonderful granddaughters, Steffi, Macah, and Faith.

REGINA PRESSLEY LAWRENCE, President & CEO, STOP Organization-Hampton Roads



Regina Pressley Lawrence was born and raised in Portsmouth, Virginia to Anthony and Dorothy Pressley, over sixty years ago. Regina and her husband of thirty-two years, William T. Lawrence, a native of Norfolk, Virginia, currently reside in Chesapeake, Virginia; they are the proud parents of three adult daughters, seven grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Regina graduated from I. C. Norcom High School in Portsmouth, Virginia with honors and matriculated at St. Augustine's College in Raleigh, North Carolina majoring in Sociology with a minor in Psychology. She is also an alumnae of Norfolk State University with course work in Real Estate Law and Statistics. Under the strong leadership, mentorship and friendship of Mr. Harvey N. Johnson, Jr., former Executive Director of The STOP Organization, Mrs. Lawrence began her life-long STOP career of helping others to better themselves with an open mind, positive attitude, goal setting, planning, hard work, determination and discipline.

Over the course of thirty-eight plus years, Mrs. Lawrence has either written or co-authored more than one hundred grant applications for STOP; most of which were funded. Grant funding amounts to multiple millions of dollars generated for the Agency. Mrs. Lawrence is most proud of her role in the authorship and development of STOP's Community Food and Nutrition grant which was later spun off into the Southeastern Virginia Food Bank, STOP's Weatherization Program which has remained with STOP for over thirty years and the current Chesapeake Department of Social Services Transportation Program which transports customers to and from work, training and daycare, 24 hours per day, 7 days per week, 365 days per year. For a period of almost forty years, these three initiatives alone have assisted thousands of low and moderate income individuals and their families achieve some level of stabilization and in many instances provided the "hand up" to thrive!

Mrs. Lawrence has served in numerous positions at STOP. To name a few, Executive Assistant to the Board/Data and Grants Coordinator; Assistant to the Director of Operations and Development; Administrative Assistant to the Executive Director; Director for Management Information and Employment Resources and Vice President of Impact and Stabilization Initiatives. Her wide-range of capability and responsibility have always challenged her to consistently enhance her skill sets for a greater contribution to her family and service to STOP in its mission to upgrade the quality of life for low and moderate income families.

On January 18, 2011, Mrs. Lawrence was appointed President and CEO by the STOP Board of Directors. At that time, Mrs. Lawrence re-organized the Agency structure to promote and achieve clearer lines of communication; financial and programmatic accountability and greater productivity and efficiency. Customer service is extremely important to Mrs. Lawrence. Many years ago, she coined the phrase for STOP that "our clients must to be treated with dignity and respect; our clients are our customers and our customers are our business!"

Mrs. Lawrence has received state and national recognition, and commendations for excellence in her work. She served as an editor for the Virginia Weatherization Association Resource Pool Newsletter, and has been a member of the following: National Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) Task Force for Monitoring and Assessment of Community Action Agencies; CSBG Statewide Task Force for the Development of Uniform Community Action Agency Outcomes; CSBG Program Design Task Force; Statewide Peer Team of Programmatic Auditors; Conference of Minority Public Administrators, National Association of Female Executives. Mrs. Lawrence spearheaded the process to certify STOP as an Evidenced-Based Organization and was the co-recipient of the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Inc.'s 2013 Humanitarian of the Year Award.

Gary T. McCollum, Senior Vice President and General Manager, Cox Communications



Gary T. McCollum is the senior vice president and general manager for Cox Communications' Virginia system, a position he was appointed to in February 2010. He is responsible for the day-to-day operations of all Cox services in Virginia, including Hampton Roads, Roanoke, Fairfax County and Fredericksburg, serving nearly 770,000 households and over 2,300 employees.

Gary joined Cox Communications in 1989 as a manager trainee in Hartford, Conn., and was later promoted to a variety of management roles, including plant operations manager, director of network development, and vice president of customer care. He went on to serve as vice president and general manager for Cox's Roanoke cable system, spearheading efforts to bring the Information Superhighway to all segments of the community, and in 2000, was promoted to vice president and general manager of Cox's newly acquired Northern Virginia system. In 2006, Gary was promoted to lead the Cox Hampton Roads system and then led the consolidation of all locations into one Virginia operation.

Gary was honored with the prestigious Vanguard Award for Cable Operations Management from the National Cable Telecommunications Association in 2003. The Cable World Magazine named the Cox Northern Virginia operation the "*Cable System of the Year*" under his direction. Gary has been inducted into the Virginia Commonwealth University's *Virginia Communications Hall of Fame* and the Virginia Cable Telecommunications Association *Virginia Cable Hall of Fame*. He is also the recipient of the Northern Virginia Community Foundation's *Community Leadership Award* and the Fairfax County NAACP *Corporate Trailblazer Award*, and has appeared for five years on the CableFAX list of *Most Influential Minorities in Cable*.

Prior to joining Cox, Gary served eight years on active duty as a military intelligence officer for the U.S. Army and is currently a major in the U.S. Army Reserves. During his active duty military career, he served with the elite U.S. Army Rangers.

Gary is active in community and industry-related projects. He currently is a member of or serves on the board for the following organizations: Virginia Chamber of Commerce, Blueprint Virginia, Hampton Roads Chamber of Commerce (HRCC), Hampton Roads Partnership (HRP), Smart Beginnings, and the Virginia Cable Telecommunications Association (VCTA), among others. In addition, he is the founding Chair of Elevate Early Education (E3), an early childhood education advocacy organization in Virginia.

Born in a housing project in Richmond, Va., Gary was the first member of his family to graduate from college. He graduated from James Madison University with a bachelor's degree in Russian Studies and Political Science, and earned an M.B.A. from the University of Connecticut, where he concentrated on telecommunications. Gary, a licensed Christian Minister, and his wife, Cookie, reside in Virginia Beach, VA, and have two daughters.

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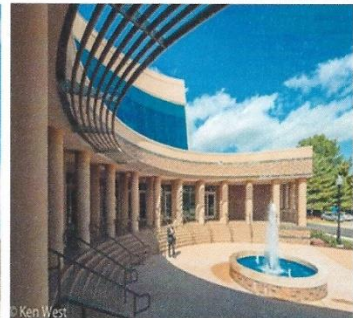
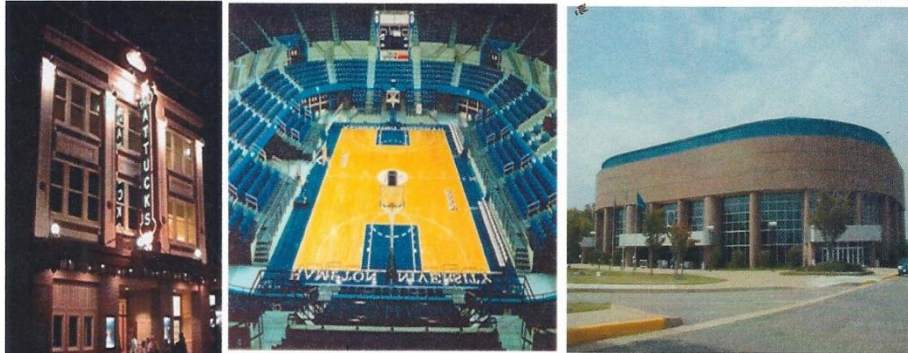
